My role at Mangakahia Area School is as Deputy Principal in charge of the curriculum. I am looking forward to leading the development of a culturally relevant curriculum which is engaging for all and enables all tauira (students) to develop their potential. This year has started with offering a number of new subjects such as Art History, Horticulture, Media Studies, Photography and Te Ao Haka and then building a timetable around student selections. Our 2023 timetable also includes all students taking part in Te Ao Māori lessons.

Kaupapa of Learning: The start of the year has involved consolidating the school Kaupapa of Learning (included in this edition) which outlines the school's high expectations. Part of these expectations are for tauira to be fully equipped with the required stationery and books for all their lessons, a school bag and a water bottle. Physical Education is compulsory for all students up to Year 10 and an option for senior students. Students are expected to bring a change of clothes for physical education lessons, which shouldn't be worn under their uniform. If there is a medical reason for them to not do PE they need to bring a note.

Student Leadership Team 2023

Mangakahia Area School principal Maria Dunn said she wanted to make positive changes in the school, which caters to rangitahi from Years 1 through to 13 and has 90 students currently enrolled.

"I came in last term, and I thought to reset this kura and give our young people hope, belonging and identity, and do [things] with [students], rather than to [them]," she said.

Five students form the executive committee - three are in Year 12 and two are in Year 11. To apply for the role, students had to develop a CV and cover letter and carry out a presentation to students and staff. The group meets fortnightly to discuss issues and ideas within the school.

Dunn said the aim was to create a "real" experience for budding leaders and to demonstrate what was involved. "If we want leaders and to empower young people ... we need to start tapping into these things now for these kids to be courageous."

The initiative would also hopefully inspire the aspirations of younger students.

"We want to have the babies in Year 1 to be going, 'One day I'm going to be like her'," Dunn said. "How do we say there's a world out there? This might be the stepping stone [for them] to be innovative and create, and let the world be their oyster."

Manukura wahine [head girl] Anahera Kaipo was excited to help the school improve.

Though she felt "lots of pressure", Kaipo believed she could handle it.

Her heart was "beating so fast" when the leaders were announced at a school assembly last Friday.

"I was so nervous," she laughed. "It was a bit nerveracking."

Manukura tāne [head boy] Rangiatea Marsh was "actually quite surprised" when he was named head boy - but excited.

Marsh said a leadership team in a kura was important because it gave younger students "something to aim for."

Sports rangatira Lavinia Waa enjoys boxing and netball, but said being in her role is much more than sports.

Her hope is that she and her peers' roles will "give students a voice."
